Scholars in the 18<sup>th</sup> century understood that democracies never last and this idea was elaborated by James Madison in Federalist #10<sup>3</sup> of the Federalist Papers.

Although America's original sin is clearly the irony that slavery was not abolished at its founding, our founders did create a society that cherishes freedom, law and order, and as Frederick Douglass predicted, the U.S. Constitution would be the "liberty document" to abolish the abhorrent practice of slavery. In his famous speech in 1860, he said, "Now, take the Constitution according to its plain reading, and I defy the presentation of a single pro-slavery clause in it. On the other hand, it will be found to contain principles and purposes, entirely hostile to the existence of slavery."


